Last month: Our branch library

Ours is one of the few NZSG branches with our own rooms and library. As well as books, we have an extensive range of electronic and printed resources to help you with your genealogy research. The focus is on New Plymouth and Taranaki historical records, but we also have lots of material from New Zealand, the UK, and other locations.

At the November meeting, Bruce Bellini outlined the records that we have in the library. Bruce also explained the Taranaki Biographical Index, with over 800,000 records indexing records relevant to Taranaki research. This was illustrated by way of an example, taking just a name and using the TBI to search out a range of relevant books and records. These included birth, death and marriage records, school admissions, newspaper clippings, land records and others.

Marilyn Armitstead explained the library contents, how these are organised, and how to use Athenaeum, the library database, to search for books.




Last month: The Leeds Method for DNA

At our November afternoon meeting, Sharyn Guthrie explained the Leeds method for DNA matches. This session was planned for September, but had to be postponed due to COVID level 2.

The Leeds method is a colourful way of sorting all those DNA matches that you get, into the various branches of your tree where they belong.


