July Meeting - Using Ancestry.com

At our July meeting, Sharyn Guthrie showed us some features of <u>Ancestry.com</u>. This is a major genealogy website, with lots and lots of features. You can have a free account, or pay a subscription to get access to their vast collection of records. Sometimes, they offer discounts on subs, so look out for those.

Be sure to set up your profile with information so that other genealogists can contact you. Link your profile to you in your tree.

Set the privacy level for your tree.

- public tree, others can find it through searches, but living people are not visible
- private tree, not visible to others unless shared with them. Can opt to exclude from search results

Ancestry has lots of records. Download any that are of interest to you, as they may not always be available on line.

The search function has lots of settings and features. Sharyn explained how to use these. Check all the options to improve your searches.

Though you need to have a subscription to search on Ancestry at home, you can access it at Puke Ariki for free.

Maps in Our library

I thought I would share the use of another part of the library – the stuff in the map drawer. It is probably a bit of a mystery to most of you as to what those drawers hold but there are things of interest in them such cemetery plans, family trees, plans of NP prison, old street maps, old newspapers and so on.

My story starts with a research enquiry I received. The person who contacted us wanted to know the whereabouts of a property called *Airedale* on Junction Road near Inglewood.

I was given the name of the man and the fact he lived on Junction Road 1 mile from Inglewood in 1882.

From research on line I found the following:

- In 1882 James Kidd was building a double roofed house about 1 mile out of town on Junction Road (Taranaki Herald 19/07/1882)
- According to the electoral roll 1885, James Kidd had a residential property & was a farmer. Land at 104 & 105 Tarurutangi.
- In January 1886 he lived at Airedale (newspaper article 12 Jan 1886).
- In 1891 he owned & occupied section 104 & 105. He also occupied 102, owned by Frank Douglas Kidd (Land Transfer Act notice in Taranaki Herald 25/08/1891)
- He died in 1894 at his residence *Airedale* Inglewood (Taranaki Herald 18/07/1894)
- In 1910 *Airedale* Inglewood is mentioned as a house to let. It had 6 rooms and 12 acres of land (Taranaki Herald 15/01/1910).

I remembered the maps in the map drawers. I looked at the catalogue that resides on the top of the drawers in our rooms. Yes, we had maps of Tarurutangi and Inglewood. I looked at those maps and found the Lands & Survey Cadastral map of 1963. This showed that Sections Pt 104 & PT 105 Tarururutangi Distrct were on Junction Road (which is the main road between Egmont Village). It was on the corner of Junction Road and Lepper Road Lower. That is approx 1.8 miles from the centre of Inglewood. So I am reasonably sure that this is where *Airedale* was.

I then looked at the current details of the property from the Council web site. The property had changed since 1963. The land was probably subdivided, as the property now only comprises 5.5 acres and I can see that the house built by James

Kidd is no longer there.

I am so glad that I was able to use the maps in our library to help locate a property. It is amazing what information we hold.

It pays to be cheeky ...

On a recent trip to Whanganui where my Great-Grandparents settled in 1875, I walked along the banks of the river toward the railway bridge, thinking that I might also walk along the Eastown Rd to see the house that they had owned, from where my Grandad and most of his siblings went to school at Aramoho primary across the river and from where Great-Grandad and almost all his children went to work at the Eastown Railway workshops. The house was across the road from the railway line and workshops, and I stood on the railway embankment looking at the house where my grandfather and his eight siblings were brought up. The front door was open, so I guessed someone was at home.

In a moment of impulse, I crossed the road and knocked on the door. When I explained why I was there, I was invited into what would have been the front sitting room, had a cup of tea and an interesting discussion with the current owners who brought out a copy of the current title dated May 1926. It seems that about that time Whanganui had updated all the property titles, but it was definitely the house that had been my Great-Grandparents before their deaths in 1912 and 1914. The 1926 title was in the names of two of the sons (my Great-Uncles) as trustees and then changed when one of the sons bought the house outright. We crouched on the floor looking at the title deeds and other documents that the owners held. I took photos and shared with them my ancestors' early days in the house.

I was shown through the house, the front sitting room, three bedrooms off the central hallway, one for parents, one for the girls and one for the boys. At the rear of the house was a very small kitchen and a separate breakfast room. A small porch off the back door and then a path to the long-drop toilet. Very few changes had been made. In a concession to modern living, what had been the parent's bedroom was now the inside toilet and bathroom.

In all my research into family, I have yet to come across anyone who has not been prepared to talk about the past, even, as in this case, my hosts were totally unrelated.
