Undesirable Settlers

Was your ancestor deemed to be an undesirable settler? Well, who would know and who would decide? I'm not going to be able to answer that question but I will explain why the question is posed.

In our quest to ensure all documents held in our genealogy library are catalogued and shelved, I found a box labelled "miscellaneous shipping information". It has probably been in said box for twenty years or more. However it did not just include shipping stuff, it was a hodge podge of bits and pieces, all of which have now been sorted.

One of the sets of paper intrigued me. It is a photocopy of a hand written list of emigrants taken in the Government Brig *Victoria* from New Plymouth to Auckland on January 2nd 1845. It lists their names, occupations, in which ship they arrived in New Plymouth (from England) and age group of the children. It is mentioned that 3 men whose wives were on the ship had previously walked to Auckland from New Plymouth. Passengers totalled 57.

Page 2 of this document is what interested me as it is a photocopy of a letter to Colonel William Wakefield from J T Wickstead, Resident Agent for New Plymouth, which said:

"I enclose a list of those emigrants removed to Auckland in the Government Brig. With one or two exceptions, they are very undesirable settlers."

Surnames mentioned are: Goninan, Harper, Williams, Harvey, Polkinghorne, Collins, Gribble, Millsteed, Rogers, George, Knuckey, Lukies, Argle, Pascoe.

So that letter is why I wonder who decides whether a person is an undesirable emigrant or not.

- You can wear a face mask at the society rooms.



It was in the basement where some years earlier, it was the repair room of the cycle shop that was upstairs back then.

Ted Riddick was very supportive of our genealogy branch and he provided us these rooms at a very reasonable rental which continues to be so to this day.
