For this meeting we are having a NIGHT OUT AT THE MOVIES. Hamish Guthrie is showing us the new Taranaki Media Archive that he and a board have set up to help preserve our local history, in audio/ visual form. You will see some great old films, and maybe you have something hidden away at home that you could contribute to the collection.

The August meeting (can't believe I'm talking about August already), we will have a demonstration of some UK websites that can help with finding baptisms, marriages and deaths. The FreeREG, FreeBMD and the FreeCEN sites are part of the FreeUKGenealogy project. It is a charity that utilises volunteer workers and undertakes transcriptions across the United Kingdom. At present, they have 288 million records on FreeBMD, 44.5 million records on FreeCEN and 55 million records on FreeREG. These are websites I use regularly and are very easy to navigate.

We are still receiving your membership payments. Our Treasurer Sharyn will be contacting you if you haven't paid recently, but we do understand that as the cost-of-living crisis worsens, some things just have to go by the board, and sometimes it is the club memberships that have to go.

We have also dropped the \$2 door charge for our meetings, but don't forget to bring some change for the raffle.

NZ Births, Deaths, Marriages

The criteria for historical BDM records have recently been relaxed a little, meaning that more records are available for searching.

The registry of births deaths and marriages for New Zealand is administered by Internal Affairs. Historical records can be searched on their website, and a print out of a record can be ordered.

The database can be searched for free, which provides useful information for genealogy. The database of historical records has approximately

- 900,000 births
- 2 million deaths
- 400,000 marriages.

The criteria for historical records are now

- birth over 100 years ago
- birth of a deceased person who died 50 years ago or was born 80 years ago
- still birth 50 years ago
- marriage 75 years ago
- deaths 50 years ago, or the deceased birth was at least 80 years ago.



The Gardener - The Life of James Kidd

This book tells the story of James Kidd (1822-1894), as told by his gg-grandson. James Kidd was born in Colne, Lancashire, grew up in Gargrave, Yorkshire, and worked as a landscape gardener before emigrating to New Zealand with his wife and family in 1865. He lived and worked at Cheviot Hills and Oamaru, creating the



Oamaru Borough Gardens. He then bought a farm near Inglewood, Taranaki, calling it "Airedale". He farmed it with his sons and retired there.
