

DNA Interest Group

The August meeting ended up being cancelled due to me getting Covid.

The good news is that I am all ready for our September meeting on Sunday 15 Sep at 13:30hrs. This will be about clustering, and I'll be demonstrating this on Ancestry.



Clustering is key to working out your DNA matches and how they potentially might be related to you. I sent out some sheets asking you to fill in your family names or gaps where they are unknown of your great grandparents down. This will give you time to do that. Please bring your laptop if you have one or your tablet. I'm hoping that you will do it along with me and see how it shows up in your family lines.

As it's using shared matches you do need an Ancestry subscription or a AncestryDNA Plus subscription. The latter costs about \$45 for 6 months.

Even if you don't have a subscription of any kind come along and watch someone else do the clustering, it will all help with understanding DNA matches.

School Admission Records



As you may be aware, we are trying to tidy up the school admission slips which are held in the white boxes, against the wall in the meeting room area. The slips were originally held in two series, one being the older ones and the other, the newer ones which, many years ago, had been held in a separate place. Janice is merging the two sets starting from Z and I have been working from A. Hopefully one day

we will meet. Once that is done, we will spread them out more evenly and re-label the boxes – nicely!

From this exercise, I have become increasingly aware just how often many children changed schools, especially in the earlier days, presumably because their parents moved around. disruptive that must have been for these families. It's foreign to me, the school admission records indicate I started at Fitzroy School in 1952 and left in 1957 to go the Highlands Intermediate. The registers for NPGHS show I started there in 1960 and left in 1962 to go to a Government Office. So I only ever attended 3 schools. I always lived at the same address from when I was born until I left when I got married. I never had to struggle with any change of home or school, so it's hard for me to imagine how it was for those who moved so much. One pupil, Dorothy Adams moved primary schools 8 times!

rooms, the At our school admission records are held in four different places. Firstly there is a series of books on the shelves to the left of the boxes. Each book relate to a particular school with the names of the pupils alphabetical order within that school.



Secondly there are the

names of all of the pupils in alphabetical order, held in the white boxes (drawers) mentioned earlier. Thirdly, there is a pdf file on computers 1 and 2 under the "collections" icon on the front screen. This captures the full information held on the admission slips. Fourthly, there is an index on the TBI (Taranaki Biographical Index) which is also held on computers 1 and 2. Please note that neither the books or the TBI have all of the pupils listed. The safest thing is to check the slips. In addition, on top of the drawers is a blue ice cream container which shows a card for each of the schools and what has been extracted from each school. Very helpful when trying to find Moturoa school (unsuccessfully) – it has not been done.

The information held can be very helpful, including date of birth of the pupil, their parent/guardian and their address. A good way of tracking movement.
