#### The trouble with names

The biggest problem with names is spelling. Everybody hears something different when told a name. And remember – a couple of hundred years ago very few people could write let alone spell!

As you've probably already discovered, many names can be spelt in many different ways.

My maiden name is Raynor – RAYNOR

I have seen it spelt: Rainer, Rayner, Reyner, Raynar, Rayner, Reiner, Rainor, ...

I had a great example of where spelling can hurt you when I was researching Maher. I found it spelt as Maher, Mahar, Mayer, Meyer, Meyar. The birth I was looking for was spelt Meher, and the mother's name used was her middle name. (But that's another story.)

Also, recently I was asked to research someone called Lavert – this name had me stumped, nothing came up at all for this spelling. It was only when I looked at our Taranaki Biographical Index and found ONE entry spelt Lauert did I have any success. I was then able to find her birth, marriage, and her parents. It's a German name, and I guess the accent would make it difficult to understand.

Knowing and being aware that the spelling could be different to what you think will help you when you are researching.


Many people could not spell or write at all even in the 20<sup>th</sup> century. And spelling isn't a lot of people's forte. So, remember – the name is spelt how the clerk hears it. Accents, lisps and ignorance didn't help. He couldn't ask how it was spelt because the person saying the name didn't know how it was spelt. So, he wrote down what he heard!

So, when you are researching and getting nowhere – remember to try every version of the name you can think of. You might be surprised what you can find!
