At our July meeting, member Lyn Humphreys told us her story of discovery that DNA results brought to her family.

It all started when an unknown visitor came to their home, and claimed to be her nephew. He said that according to DNA tests, the man he grew up believing to be his father was not, and instead it was Lyn's brother.

This led to a lot more DNA tests of Lyn's family to verify this connection. But the results were not straightforward, and took a long time to unravel.

The family has now sorted out the DNA links, with some more instances where the child's parentage was not quite what they were brought up to believe.



100 Years Ago in New Plymouth

In June 1925, a blow out and explosion occurred at the oil boring plant operated by Taranaki Oil Fields Ltd. There was extensive damage to the plant and equipment, but no injuries.

OIL WELL BLOW OUT. EXPLOSION AT MOTUROA

BURST AT THE NEW BORE.

DEBRIS SCATTERED EVERYWHERE.

STONES THROWN IN HARBOUR.

A powerful blow out of gas, heralded by a terrific roar, did damage to the oil boring plant at Moturoa and distributed mud, stones and parts of the derrick over a radius of some hundreds of yards at 6.30 last evening. The extent of the damage will not be known until to-day, but the blow out will cause drilling operations to be suspended for some days while repairs are being made to the plant. No one was injured

People living in the neighbourhood of the bore are unable adequately to describe the noise which preceded the tossing into the air of stones and mud from the bottom of the bore, which is 1488 feet from the surface. The most definite description was that the roar was something like that made when overseas vessels in port blow off steam under pressure, but infinitely louder.

All were agreed that it was aweinspiring and sufficient to cause the hearer to wonder what was happening. The roar lasted long enough to enable those who heard it to gain vantage points from which a view of the bore could be obtained.
